

INFANT & SENIOR TORNADO SAFETY CHECKLIST

A quick-reference guide to help families prepare for tornadoes. Tornado shelters are small, and you won't be inside for long — but being ready means preparing for what you'll face when you come out. Print and keep this checklist with your storm supplies.

🆺 Emergency Shelter Readiness

- □Clear path to shelter (no clutter or obstacles)
- □Wide doorway for stroller/wheelchair access
- □Non-slip flooring or mats
- □Backup lighting (flashlight, lantern, headlamp)
- □Seating for seniors
- □Quiet comfort for infants (blanket, toy, pacifier)

🍆 Infant Tornado Kit

- □Diapers, wipes, and rash cream
- □Pacifier, blanket, or small toy for comfort
- □Formula or milk for immediate use (1-2 feeds)
- □Baby medications + thermometer
- □Baby carrier or sling for hands-free mobility

👨 Senior Tornado Kit

- □ Prescription medications (1–2 doses if needed)
- □Glasses, hearing aids, or contacts with case
- □Walking aid, seat cushion, or small blanket
- □Personal hygiene items (wipes, tissues, sanitizer)
- □List of emergency contacts and medical conditions

E Family Plan Essentials

- □Assign roles: who helps whom
- □Emergency contacts: local + out-of-state
- □ Practice tornado drills monthly
- □Share printed copies with family, babysitters, and caregivers
- □Identify tools you may need after the storm (work gloves, sturdy shoes, phone charger, cash)
- $m{ imes}$ Tip: Keep your kits in waterproof bags inside or right next to your shelter, so you can move quickly
